Respected Sir,

The National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR) is a statutory body established under the Commissions for Protection of Child Rights (CPCR) Act, 2005, for the protection of child rights.

NCPCR is mandated inter alia to monitor all Laws, Policies, Programmes, and Administrative Mechanisms for Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) and implementation of Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015 which prohibits the use of intoxicating substances by children as well as use of children in peddling, carrying, selling etc of such substances.

The relevant sections of the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015 are as follows:

U/Section 77: *Whoever gives, or causes to be given, to any child any intoxicating liquor or any narcotic drug or tobacco products or psychotropic substance, except on the order of a duly qualified medical practitioner, shall be punishable with rigorous imprisonment for a term which may extend to seven years and shall also be liable to a fine which may extend up to one lakh rupees.*

U/Section 78: *Whoever uses a child, for vending, peddling, carrying, supplying or smuggling any intoxicating liquor, narcotic drug or psychotropic substance, shall be liable for rigorous imprisonment for a term which may extend to seven years and shall also be liable to a fine up to one lakh rupees.*

A study published in April, 2011 in Indian Journal of Medical Research says that nearly 10% adolescents in the age group 13-15 year, in India have smoked cigarettes, and almost half of these, reported initiating tobacco use before the age of 10, which is very detrimental to their growth and health. The early age of initiation underscores the urgent need for intervention and protection of this vulnerable group, especially children in street situations, from becoming addicts. I am enclosing a copy of the study undertaken by Karnataka State Commission for Protection of Child Rights which indicates that tobacco addiction is a gateway to hard drugs; the number of children abusing drugs is also increasing day by day. Apart from that, I am also enclosing a study conducted by National Drug Dependence Treatment Centre (NDDTC), All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS), New Delhi for NCPCR on the subject 'Assessment of Pattern and Profile of Substance Use among Children in India', which may be of interest.

NCPCR in the recent past has launched media campaigns to create awareness against use of tobacco products and other intoxicating substances by children as well as selling, buying and smuggling of these products by using children. NCPCR has also written to Directors General of Police of all State and requested them to strictly enforce Sections 77 and 78 of the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act.

We request that all concerned are directed to implement Section 77-78, JJ Act strictly to enable our children to lead a healthy life.
